Ten Tips for Small Space Gardening

Plan. A well thought out space will appear more unified. What do you want to do when you are in your space? Sketch the area on a blank piece of paper and use circles to indicate your plants. Don't forget to allow for growth and fill in. It is fun to look back and see your plans after your garden has grown.

Blur the lines. Boundaries that confine the space can be softened with borders, beds, shrubs, or climbing plants.

Choose a theme. Incorporate a theme into planting. Consider what is inside your house and extend the atmosphere outside.

Take it room by room. Think about each area as a separate room that compliments the theme. Incorporate stopping and resting points at intervals to make the space more comfortable and the total space will seem larger.

Consider scale. Choose garden accessories and furniture that match the space in scale.

Enrich the soil. Start with good soil for a successful garden. Amendments can improve the soil, improving plant feeding and irrigation. Mulch.

Add variety. Vary heights, colors and textures to make the garden more appealing and convey more depth to the space. Include vines, trellises and other vertical features to add height and take your eyes upward. This will also help to expand the space.

Impact with color. Combine similar colors or several of the same plant for a bigger impact. Paint with swatches and strips of color.

Mix it up. With the right mix of annuals, bulbs, and perennials, the garden can have blooming color from spring through fall. Also use shapes and textures.

Don't forget containers. Using plants in containers can enhance areas where they cannot be planted in the ground. Tier them effect.

What to do in the Garden in May...



May is the month to enjoy many of the perennials that will start blooming now and may stay in bloom for many months as the weather heats up.

<u>Fertilize and Prune</u>: If you haven't fertilized those spring and summer bloomers, now is

the time to add a balanced fertilizer to the soil. Fertilize shrubs that have been blooming all winter and spring before they go dormant to assure a good show next year. Azaleas and camellias will especially appreciate a dose of an acid-based feeding and a layer of mulch to get them through the summer. Now is also the time to prune these shrubs if required.

<u>Pests:</u> Rapid growth this time of year on most plants means insects will be attracted to delicate new leaves and flower buds. A sharp spray of water will take care of aphids and whiteflies and releasing beneficial insects will keep them in control. Learn to accept a little insect damage that is normal in a healthy, thriving garden. Keeping spent blooms deadheaded will prolong flowering times on some plants and will keep the garden neat and free from debris that harbors disease and insects on all plants.

Mulching: Maintain a good mulch of organic matter covering garden soil throughout the summer. This prevents crusting and cracking of the soil surface, holds in moisture, encourages earthworms, moderates soil temperatures for optimum root growth, improves the soil as it decomposes, and prevents weeds from germinating. A two-to-four inch layer of mulch decreases evaporation from the soil by 70 percent or more, allowing you to water less often (but still deeply). Keep mulch several inches away from tree trunks and plant stems, however, for good air circulation.

A good source for when to plant each type of food plant is The Old Farmer's Almanac plant calendar, specific to San Diego, Riverside and Orange County (hardiness zone 10a or 10b).
